

Fall At The Front Door

The title of this article refers to the season, fall, not the verb which might be reserved for New Year's Eve and be experienced when coming home from a late night out. Fall is upon us and it's worth pondering what your front door says about this time of year.

Want to add some fall color to your front door? Even though there is an abundance of plants displaying fall color, for help I browsed the Proven Winners website. This is a company that grows beautiful bedding plants and creates lovely container gardens. A good rule of thumb to follow when planting a container garden is to **use a 'thriller', 'filler' and a 'spiller'**. This container idea that I'm sharing with you (at right) however, didn't stick to that rule as it used two thrillers and a spiller, but the combination of plants in the thoughtfully selected container make it work. Also remember, your filler or thriller doesn't have to be a plant, you can place an appropriately sized pumpkin or something else

in the container. How is this container design for a fall look at your front door?

Follow this simple recipe: Plant one **Million Bells 'Terra Cotta'** (this will spill), one **Graceful Grasses 'Toffee Twist'** (thriller), and one **Coleus 'Sedona'** (thriller). If you can't find these specific plants, you can substitute. What I liked about this combination was the formal, urn-like container, but you

can be creative in choosing what will house your plants.

Here are more suggestions to fill a container. Thrillers like **Mums**, **Alternanthera 'Burgundy Threadleaf'** or **Coleus 'Henna'** give you a good start with their fall colors. Don't forget grasses like **Pennisetum 'Fireworks'** and **Carex 'Orange Sedge'**. **Colocasia** such as **'Jet Black'** or **'Black Magic'** offers a thriller plant that will get your container noticed. Fill in with non plant items like a pumpkin, mini scarecrow, gourds, or maize. 'Filler' plant choices include **Pansies**, **Violas**, **Gazanias**, **Gaillardias**, **Impatiens** (Accent Orange will work), **Begonias**, and **Heuchera**. If you are looking for spillers, look no further than **Lantana 'Luscious Marmalade'** or **Ipomea 'Ace of Spades'** or **'Midnight Lace'**.

What about a scarecrow at your front door? Both stores have **scarecrow kits** and in our Poway store, it has been a hoot building these guys and gals. Add old clothes and straw and you've got something for your front door that will make you the envy of the neighborhood. Kits make either a 4' or 6' tall scarecrow. You can also purchase additional faces. Kits are \$29.99. This makes a fun carnival game, hostess gift, or project to do with the family. ●

It's pollinated by Sweet Treat Pluerry™ or Burgundy Plum. Chill hours are 500-600 hours. ●

Old Ben: Hawks

In the last month, I received several inquiries from bird lovers asking how to keep hawks from eating their wild birds. The answer may surprise you.

Birders are often alarmed when a hawk visits their yard, but encouraging hawks is actually the gold standard of backyard birding. Because a neighborhood will have fewer resident hawks than other birds, and because raptors require a rich, vibrant ecosystem to thrive, attracting hawks is an excellent achievement that shows just how bird friendly a backyard can be.

While it can be upsetting to see a raptor make a meal of a goldfinch, dove, or other favorite backyard bird, the existence of raptors in a neighborhood is strong evidence of a wildlife friendly area. Hawks do not only prey on birds. Lots of raptors eat snakes, large insects, and rodents like, mice, rats, and squirrels.

Not every raptor is likely to make an appearance in a birder's backyard. It depends on where that backyard is and what the nearby habitat is like. Eagles, vultures and other large raptors are unlikely to be backyard guests except in very special circumstances, but smaller raptors that are more adaptable may visit backyards.

In our area the most common backyard raptors include: American Kestrel, Coopers Hawk, Great Horned Owl, Merlin, Red Shouldered Hawk, Red Tailed Hawk, Sharp Shinned Hawk, Western Screech Owl, and Barn Owls.

How To Attract Hawks The key to attracting any type of backyard bird, including raptors, is to meet the bird's

needs for food, water, shelter and nesting sites.

Food

All raptors are carnivorous, but they do not all eat the same prey. The most common backyard hawks, Coopers and Sharp Shinned, prey on smaller birds, from finches and sparrows to doves. The best way to supply that prey is to attract backyard birds with a good feeding station and other natural foods. Where the birds congregate, a raptor will eventually drop in for a snack. Raptors are usually successful on one in 10 attempts, or 10% of the time, so they will not deplete your smaller birds. Insects and rodents are also common prey. It is not acceptable to deliberately bait raptors with offers of pet mice or other treats.

Water

Most raptors do not regularly drink water; they get liquid from the blood of their prey. Raptors will visit bird baths to cool off and bathe. Bird baths need to be larger and deeper for raptors. Sturdy concrete bird baths are best. Ground bird baths are also good along with bird bath fountains.

Shelter

Raptors favor large, stable perches from which to spot prey as well as sheltered areas where they can roost after a meal. Raptors may also perch on fences, deck railings or other suitable sites.

Nesting Sites

Raptors will use the same large, mature trees for nesting that they like for

perches and shelter. Branches should be wide and stable to support raptors' larger nests, and a variety of large nesting material such as branches and twigs should be available for raptors. Some small raptors, such as Kestrels, Barn Owls, and Screech Owls, will nest in boxes.

Every day I have Coopers and Sharp Shinned Hawks make a visit to my backyard. The small birds know they are coming before I do. They fly, hop or run into the surrounding shrubs, vines and trees. Every bird is quiet as a church mouse when the hawks visit. The hawks must be successful once in awhile as they come back every day. •

Poinsettias Are On The Way

Right around Thanksgiving, you'll see Poinsettias. Their appearance, slightly stealing the spotlight of Turkey Day, is a well executed plan that times their arrival before the last week of November.

Because it takes about six months to get Poinsettias to bloom, growers began giving them loads of TLC in May. For those months, growing conditions are monitored to include monitoring soil pH levels, fertilization, and temperatures in the greenhouses, pinching them and paying close attention to light levels. Poinsettias are called a short day photoperiod crop, which means that they naturally flower when the nights become longer than the days. In commercial production, many growers use black cloth to either produce earlier crops or make the entire crop more uniform. However, recent advances in breeding have led to crops which naturally flower early enough in the season to meet early sales requirements. Conditions must be perfect or the plants delay flowering and the color is compromised.

Here is a partial list of what we'll stock this holiday season.

Autumn Leaves

New this year, Autumn Leaves poinsettia is guaranteed to provide holiday warmth with its bracts that are the colors of leaves in the fall.

Prestige

Red bracts with dark green foliage. It has a 'V'-shaped architecture, is very upright, and its bracts are less breakable.

Jubilee

Dark green leaves. Bracts are red, pink, white, or Jingle Bell. Upright habit.

Snowcap

Large, pure white bracts with medium green colored leaves.

Peterstar

Red, white, pink, or marble colored bracts with medium green colored leaves.

Ice Punch

Striking award-winning poinsettia that was the 2008 beauty queen of poinsettias. A fabulous example of a poinsettia with a patterned bract, this cultivar features cranberry and frosty white coloring amongst deep green leaves. ●

So far, fall feels like summer, but the summer plants have made their way out of the nurseries. In their place are the fall and winter edibles.

Get ready to plant **sweet onion** starts, and don't delay. These are highly perishable and are best selected within two weeks of their arrival (mid November). Another shipment is due to arrive the beginning of January.

Versatile **potatoes** are another edible that you'll want to plant and don't forget the **garlic**. **Cloves** are here, ready to be broken up and planted sharp point up!

Here's a quick guide to what else will be available to plant:

Strawberries

Albion, Alpine, Chandler, Quinault Everbearing, Seascape, Sequoia and even more!

Caneberries

Varieties of boysenberries, blackberries, raspberries, youngberries, goji berries and gooseberries are available.

Asparagus

Choices include Jersey Knight, Apollo, U.C. 72 and U.C. 157.

Olives

Arbequina, Arbosana, and Mission.

Kiwis

Choose from Issai Self Fruitful, Tomuri (Male), and Vincent (female).

Figs

We offer Black Jack, Black Mission, Brown Turkey, Celestial, Excel, Flanders, Italian Everbearing, Janice, Peter's Honey, etc.

Grapes

Finally, there are enough grape vines that you could have table grapes and wine grapes.

Do you hate those little fungus gnats that fly annoyingly around your face? They come from the soil of your houseplants and there is a cute and effective way to combat them. We have Sticky Stakes that you place in your houseplants. The Sticky Stakes look like a yellow ribbon. This is a more subtle approach to a trap as it resembles a bow in your plants rather than a big fly paper trap.

Slow Cooker Sticky Caramel Pumpkin Cake

*2 cups all-purpose flour**2 teaspoons baking powder**1 teaspoon baking soda**1/2 teaspoon salt**1 teaspoon pumpkin pie spice or ground cinnamon**1 and 1/3 cups sugar**1 cup butter, softened**4 eggs, room temperature**1 can (15 oz) solid-pack pumpkin**1 jar (16 oz) caramel sauce or ice cream topping*

1. Coat 4 1/2 quart slow cooker with nonstick cooking spray, turn to "high."

2. Combine flour, baking powder, baking soda, salt, and pumpkin pie spice in mixing bowl.

3. Beat sugar and butter in large bowl with electric mixer for about 3 minutes, until light.

4. Add eggs, one at a time, mixing well after each one.

5. Add packed pumpkin, blend until well mixed.

6. Gradually add flour mixture and beat at low speed for a minute or so until smooth.

7. Spread evenly in slow cooker and cover.

8. Cook on high setting 2 hours or until center-inserted tooth pick comes out clean.

9. Let cake stand, uncovered 10 minutes.

10. Invert onto wire rack, invert again onto serving plate.

11. Drizzle half of caramel sauce over cake. Serve warm with additional sauce. •

TO DO LIST:
November**FERTILIZE**

For lawns, use Marathon Fertilizer for fall fescue. Feed ornamentals with Gro-Power. Feed Vegetables with Gro-Power Tomato and Vegetable Food or Dr. Earth Organic Tomato and Vegetable Food. Feed Citrus, Avocado, and Fruit Trees with Gro-Power Citrus and Avocado Food. Feed Palms and Tropicals with Gro-Power Palm Tree and Tropical Food. Do not feed Camellias!

PLANT

Fall Bulbs, California Natives and drought-tolerant plants. Winter bedding selections include Violas, Pansies, Snapdragons, fragrant Stocks, Poppies, and more. Look for Pyracantha, Cotoneaster, Camellias, Azaleas, and holiday plants. You'll find vegetables as well as potatoes, garlic and onions. Looking for more edibles to plant? How about caneberrries, strawberries, kiwi, asparagus, and olives?

PEST CONTROL

This month start dormant spraying with Liqui-Cop and Oil Spray. **The wetter the winter, the more crucial dormant spraying becomes!** Clean up all foliage from beneath deciduous fruit trees and roses.

BERMUDA LAWN CARE

De-thatch and over seed Bermuda lawns with annual Rye. •

Two New Plants Arrive

Looking for an unusual addition to your garden? Look no further than **variegated Pandanus** and **Philodendron warscewiczii**. Both these rare plants are grown for their foliage. Variegated Pandanus has long yellow strap-like leaves that are edged in bright green. Philodendron warscewiczii has snowflake-like leaves and an interesting bulbous base. Make sure these plants get morning or filtered sun; they can take more sun along the coast. Both take regular water.

Buy quickly because we have a very limited supply. •
