

Peonies nabbed the top spot of the global online searches.

They are a beautiful cut flower, but not a great match to grow in our San Diego climate, unless you are in Julian. We do sell Itoh peonies from Monrovia but a member of the Andersen family who tried to grow them was not successful. That said, there have been customers who are successful and are rewarded with gorgeous blooms.

Snapdragons placed fourth in the global rankings but were number one in New

York, London, Berlin, Sydney and Abu Dhabi. Snapdragons come in an array of colors, are easy to grow and look beautiful in bouquets.

Here's an easy trend to get on board with – think pink. **Roses** were included in the top 10 trending flowers for Sydney, Mexico City and Colombo, Sri Lanka. Any pink blooms will keep in line with this trend so think carnations, dahlias,

Petunia Double 'Frosted Sapphire'

If you like the color of Ella's morning glories, you'll be a fan of Petunia Double 'Frosted Sapphire'. These are sweet, little, double petunias perfectly edged in white against a deep purple bloom.

Snapdragon Intermediate 'Yellow Red Heart'

Here's an interesting snapdragon although it lacks the 'dragon' appearance of traditional varieties. It's Snapdragon Intermediate 'Yellow Red Heart'. Enjoy the open-faced semi-double flowers with ruffly yellow petals and a red heart.

Violet 'Totally Tempted Frosted Violet'

Finally, would you like to know what totally tempted Ella that found its way to her garden? Well, it's 'Totally Tempted Frosted Violets', a cuphea (Cuphea procumbens)! The self-cleaning, violet purple and blush pink rimmed blossoms are ruffled, like violets. Pollinators love them but they are hated by deer (for you folks who share the great outdoors with them).

Drones In The House

If you asked Mary, Mary, quite contrary how her garden grows, you wouldn't expect to hear it's with the help of drones. Ask a large-scale plant grower and you might be surprised that some are contracting with drone companies to benefit from the many services drones can provide.

In the May issue of Greenhouse Grower magazine, I learned how this technology boosts production and efficiency.

Drones in greenhouses don't rely on GPS, which is tricky given the structural supports required in construction create interference. Instead, platforms with QR codes can be mounted in sections of the green house and as the drone flies its course, it is recording information. This information is uploaded and analyzed and the grower receives that information within a couple of hours.

So, what are drones doing when they fly? Drones are scouting for pests



and diseases, monitoring growth and managing inventory. From reviewing rose yields in Central America to detecting pests in orchids grown in the Netherlands, drones are also helping keep workers safe. Outside the greenhouse, Costa Farms relies on drones to use infrared imaging to assist in poly roof cleaning and applying shading compound. Drones can also detect heat leaks. Flying overhead to spot these hazards, drones can also apply roof treatments and paint which saves employees from engaging in a hazardous task.



Editor's note: Recipe from Julia Levy and made available by Southern Living. Perfect summer dip to take to the lake, beach, or pool. I'm making this for the July 4th weekend to serve on a boat, on the water!

Ingredients

• 1 (16-oz.) container sour cream (about 2 cups)

• 1 (10-oz.) can fire-roasted diced tomatoes and green chiles (such as Rotel), drained

• 1 (1-oz.) envelope ranch dressing mix

• 1 (1-oz.) envelope 25%-lesssodium taco seasoning mix. Use low sodium if you are serving with salty chips.

• 1 (8-oz.) pkg. shredded Cheddar-Jack or mild Cheddar cheese (about 2 cups)

• 1/4 cup thinly sliced scallions (about 2 medium) (optional)

• Tortilla chips, Fritos, crackers, cut up vegetables or potato chips, for serving.

Directions

Combine ingredients: Stir together sour cream, diced tomatoes, ranch mix, taco seasoning, and cheese in a medium bowl. Top with scallions. •

Check that drip irrigation is working properly



Look for Hibiscus

Fertilize

> For lawns, use Marathon Fertilizer.

> Feed ornamentals, vegetables, citrus, avocado, fruit trees, palms and tropicals with E.B. Stone or Dr. Earth.

> Add Ada Perry's Magic Formula to your regular rose feeding schedule this month.

Water

> Through October, keep a close watch on watering to make sure plants do not suffer from drought.

> Adjust sprinkler clocks or provide supplemental watering to avoid stress to plants.

> Make sure lawn sprinklers are working properly to prevent waste and dead spots.

> Mulch plants to conserve water and dress up planting beds.



Use Ada Perry's on roses

Prune

> Coral trees and roses.

Plant

> Plant anything! Just make sure they get plenty of water! New plantings will require more frequent, shallower waterings than established plants.

Look for Plumeria, Hibiscus,
Lantana, Plumbago, Gardenias, and
bedding plants.
