To Your Garden




Do you think there is too much sunshine in Southern California? The growers of Ligustrum 'Sunshine' don't think so and want to see more of it in your garden. Ligustrum 'Sunshine' offers sunny, year-round golden foliage. If you are looking for a low hedge, this will fit the bill and you can shear it like boxwood. Best of all, it is easy to care for, provides year round color, is non-invasive and is water wise!! Plant in full sun with room to grow to 3'-5' tall by 3'-4' wide. For those who are plagued by deer, this is a deer resistant plant. •

# The History Of Walter Andersen Nursery

In 1932 after the nursery had been in business for four years. Walter Andersen, Sr., moved the operation to the corner of Pacific Highway and Taylor Street. Today, that is home to the Old Town State Park parking lot and Old Town Transit Center.

Once settled, Walter continued to develop the landscaping business and

the nursery. He began acquiring land for expansion: one purchase was the property at 3860 Rosecrans. In 1937 Walter opened the business there where it became the nursery's flagship location for the next 32 years. It's hard to believe that when the nursery opened, there wasn't a store building. merely a small office.



It wasn't all business as the year before, Walter married Byrdie Sorensen, his childhood friend from Boelus, Nebraska. Walter Jr. arrived in 1940.


As the business grew, Walter added the store, offices and warehouse. One of the distinctive features of the site, was the massive steel gates that were installed at the entrance. According to Walter Jr., the heavy steel decorative gates were once sky light grates that were salvaged from a building earmarked for demolition. Walter Sr.'s brother, Lawrence, known as Corky, converted the grates into the gates that remained at the Rosecrans location until the nursery moved in 1969 to Enterprise Street. When they were removed, one of the gates made its way into storage where it remained until a couple of years ago when it was stolen, presumably for scrap. The fate of the other gate is unknown.

Around 2013, Ken Andersen commissioned local artist and friend, Paul Hobson, to redraw the gates to scale

# Rosie The Riveter Rose

What could be a more beautiful tribute to the women who went to work during World War II than a rose named in their honor? Such a movement is underway to honor these women in a very special way, beginning with a very special rose.

Partners from Spirit of '45 worked with the American Rosie the Riveter Association and Weeks Roses to create this memorial rose. It is described as having old-fashioned flowers of orange-gold suffused with pink. The foliage is glossy and dark. Fragrant blooms are moderately fruity and spicy.

Nearly 19 million women reported to work to fill jobs left vacant by soldiers. They supported the war effort in every capacity, yet the work they did and the essential role they played in winning the war has been overlooked. No official memorial for these working women has been created.

Spirit of '45 is a non-profit collaboration of partners who want to honor the women, known as Rosies, by building living rose garden memorials that would be planted in network gardens around the country. Collectively these gardens would be known as the Rosie the Riveter Memorial Rose Garden.

# TO DO LIST: January



### PLANTING

This is the ideal time to plant bare root roses, fruit trees, and ornamentals. Shop early for the best selection.

### **Plant These Vegetables Now:**

Artichoke, Asparagus, Beets (seed), Broccoli, Cabbage, Carrots (seed), Celery, Endive, Kale, Kohlrabi (seed), Lettuce, Onions, Parsley, Parsnips, Peas, Radish (seed), Spinach, Swiss Chard, and Turnips (seed).

### LOOK FOR

Camellias, Azaleas, Holly, Pyracantha, roses and fruit trees. Don't miss Pansies, Violas, Stocks and Snapdragons.

### PRUNING

**Now Is The Time to Prune:** Roses, deciduous trees, shrubs, and vines including fruit trees, grapes and berry vines.

**Pruning Tools:** Use well-maintained, sharp shears. Replace worn Felco pruner blades and springs with new ones for easier pruning.

### **PEST CONTROL**

**Dormant Spray** for diseases and over wintering insects. Use oil spray to control overwintering insects and insect eggs.

**Use Liqui-Cop** to control fungus on fruit trees and roses, Peach Leaf Curl and more on peaches and nectarines.

### LAWN CARE

**Apply High Yield Weed & Feed** to prevent Crabgrass and other weed seed from germinating as the weather warms up.

### ROSES

**Ada Perry's Magic Formula:** Apply to established roses and add with fertilizer when planting. •



# Old Ben:

# Birds & Berries

Berries are an important food source for many birds during the winter, especially when the ground is either frozen or extremely cold. Those conditions make it hard for the birds to find worms, snails or insects.

Some birds like thrushes, redwing blackbirds, and cedar waxwings secure most of their winter food from berries. Interestingly, some berries that are tasty for birds are poisonous to humans.

Some plants use berries as a clever way to entice birds and other animals to distribute their seeds. A plant that produces berries surrounds the seed in juicy, fleshy pith, rewarding the birds that eat them with vitamins and energy.

Some berry seeds, like juniper, will actually grow better after passing through a bird's gut, a process which removes natural chemicals that would otherwise prevent the seed from growing. Other berry seeds, like mistletoe, are sticky and must cause birds some frustration when sticking to their beaks. The birds

wipe their beaks on other trees, thus unwittingly sowing more mistletoe plants.

Most berries are red or black. This makes the berries easier for birds to find. Evergreens and plants that produce berries when their leaves are still green, generally produce red berries which show up well against a green background. Black berries are thought to be more visible against leaves that have turned yellow or brown.

Birds feed in different ways. Thrushes and waxwings feed in flocks. Many other birds will feed alone, hoping to keep the berries all to themselves.

Thrushes and waxwings prefer berries with smaller seeds, as they are really interested in the flesh. Other birds like grossbeaks can make use of the seed and are attracted to berries with large seeds, like hawthorn and cherries.

Winter is a good time to consider planting fruit and berry-bearing trees and shrubs in your garden. These plants
