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WAN At The Fair



Water Plants

San Diego County is home to poor soil. For plants to flourish, our nursery professionals recommend you amend the soil, add products to help build it up, and they boast about the benefits of compost.

If you have a water garden, you don't have to mess with that. Many plants will thrive in the wet environment and they'll require little to no care. At this time of year, water plants and marginals are at peak selection. Marginal water plants grow in shallow water or in moist soil around the

Marigold

Alyssum and Lobelia make wonderful lower growing plants (about 6" to 8" high) spreading to about 12" in diameter. These are great filler plants to cover the soil in between other flowers. They are available in many colors from snow white to deep blue and purples. They perform well in full sun if you keep the soil moist.

Impatiens are another summer color blockbuster, but these perform best in part sun or full shade. There are many colors of blooms but not in yellow.

Bedding Begonias are very colorful and bloom and bloom. The ones with the burgundy foliage can grow in more sun than the green leafed varieties. Blooms are pink, white or red. These can make great border plants to highlight other plantings.

Tuberous Begonias produce spectacular larger blooms. The colors are so pure



and bright, it looks like the flowers have been dipped in paint. The foliage is deep green and generally larger than the bedding begonias mentioned above. Tuberous Begonias do best in medium to deeper shaded areas.

All of the above look wonderful in hanging baskets. To make a basket, use Edna's Best or Recipe 420 potting soil and plant directly in that, no mixing required. For a 10" hanging container you can crowd the plants just a little (5 or 6 plants to a pot) and they will look finished and perfect in only a week or so.

Take a peek at our bedding plant selections in both stores; I'm sure you can find other plants for summer color as well. Just remember to water hanging plants a little more often to keep them happy. •

perimeter of the water garden. While they like their feet wet, they do not grow in deeper water like other waterloving plants. Marginal water plants can usually only handle growing in six inches of water at the deepest.

Marginals include: Cattails, Japanese Sweet Flag, Papyrus, Canna lilies as well as the related Thalia, Parrot Feather, Marsh Marigold, Pickerel (loved by butterflies), Sagittaria, Water Celery, Nymphoides geminata (a big seller at our stores and they bloom with yellow or white flowers), and Horsetail. Many of these are sold in dwarf sizes which are a better fit for the size of most ponds.

Floating pond plants are of two types:

those which are rooted with floating leaves (and those which are not rooted in the sediment, but just float on the surface, like water lettuce, water hyacinth, bladderwort, and common duckweed. Water hyacinth and water lettuce are invasive and in mass quantities will deplete the water of oxygen and will lead to fish dying. Don't let them take over your pond.

Water lilies and Lotus are grown from tubers and root into soil. In home water gardens, they are rooted into containers of heavy soil suitable for water gardens. For best results, plant them in a container, add gravel to the surface of the soil to hold soil in while settling in the water then sink the container into the pond.

For an expert's advice, I turned to Tom Dougherty in our Poway store, who has more knowledge than an encyclopedia when it comes to pond plants. One of his favorites is **Water Hawthorne** because unlike most water plants, it does not go dormant. You'll have something floating on the surface of your pond year round. It grows from a small bulb; has long, narrow leaves and blooms profusely, with small red and green leaves that will stick up and out of the water when planted in shallow areas.

There's also **Vallisneria**, a large, grass-like aquatic plant with translucent pale green leaves that grow toward the surface like ribbons. Use this plant with weighted anchors, containers, or plant several bunches together in a pot with soil. •

TO DO LIST:

June



FERTILIZE

For lawns, use Marathon Fertilizer for tall fescue, and Bonide DuraTurf Weed & Feed to feed grass and control broadleaf weeds. Feed ornamentals with Gro-Power. Feed vegetables with Gro-Power Tomato and Vegetable Food or Dr. Earth Organic Tomato and Vegetable Food. Feed citrus, Avocado, and fruit trees with Gro-Power Citrus and Avocado Food. Feed palms and tropicals with Gro-Power Palm Tree and Tropical Food.

PRUNE

Ornamentals for shape. Dead head **roses, Dahlias** and other flowering plants. Prune **stone fruits** after harvest.

PEST CONTROL

Look for **slugs** and **snails**; apply Sluggo and Sluggo Plus. Watch for **mildew, rust** and **rose slug** on roses; spray with Bayer 3 in 1 Insect Disease and Mite Control. Eliminate **sowbugs, earwigs, cutworms, slugs** and **snails** in vegetable gardens with Sluggo Plus. Keep **flies** around trash cans under control by using fly traps that can catch them before they invade your trash.

PLANT

Plant bedding plants, Bougainvillea, Hibiscus, Tropicals, fruit trees and shrubs. Look for Jacaranda, Magnolias, Hydrangeas, Star Jasmine, Dipladenias, Plumeria, Fuchsias, Roses, Summer Vegetables and Annuals. •

Old Ben:

The Western Bluebird

Can you imagine eating bugs and berries and living inside a tree? Western bluebirds do just that. They are members of the thrush family, meaning that they are related to robins. Bluebirds eat mostly insects. Grasshoppers, earthworms, snails and beetles are among their favorite foods. They sit on perches and drop quickly to the ground to catch their food or they can catch insects in the air. Bluebirds also eat fruit and berries, especially during the winter when there are fewer insects.

Why Bluebirds Need Our Help

Populations of western bluebirds have declined over the past 50 years. The main reason for their decline is competition for nest holes from European starlings and English house sparrows. Starlings and house sparrows came from somewhere else and don't occur naturally in North America. These birds were brought here and multiplied very quickly. They out compete many of our native birds for nesting habitat.

Creating Habitat

Bluebirds need places to nest. Old trees often have many woodpecker holes that they can use. To help them find a home, don't remove all of the dead trees in your area if possible. They are important for wildlife.

Nest boxes have greatly helped increase populations of bluebirds in many areas. Bluebirds will nest in boxes if they are well made and placed in a good location. Building bluebird trails is popular throughout the country. A bluebird trail is a series of bluebird nest boxes along a path planted with berry plants. The path should be near an open area where bluebirds can forage for insects. Small shrubs and trees with berries are important for bluebirds, especially in winter. Elderberry, juniper,

red cedar, bayberry, cherry and sumac have berries that bluebirds like. Because Western Bluebirds are mainly insectivors, they can be attracted to feeders if you offer mealworms. Bluebirds need places to perch while they look for insects, so tree limbs and brush piles near open areas make great perches. Don't forget a birdbath. Bluebirds like shallow birdbaths lined with flat rocks, Place the birdbath in an open area with a perch nearby so bluebirds feel safe.

Bluebird Facts

- Nesting occurs from March through August. Only the female incubates the four to six eggs, which she maintains at a temperature of 98 - 100 degrees F.
- Both sexes defend territories; the males tend to defend territory edges while females primarily defend the nest.
- A bluebird can spot caterpillars and insects in tall grass at a distance of over 50 yards.
- Bluebirds can fly at speeds up to 45 miles per hour.
- Bluebirds have no blue pigments in their feathers. Instead, each feather barb has a thin layer of cells that absorb all wavelengths of color except blue. Only the blue wavelength is reflected and scattered, resulting in their blue appearance to our eyes. •
