Grandiflora rose with double, non-fading red blooms that do not burn, even in high temperatures. It has high disease resistance, wonderful repeat blooming, and a lovely mild fragrance.

Oldest & Favorites

The oldest roses we will have are the climbers Zepherine Drouhin (1868), Cecile Brunner (1881) and Don Juan (1958). Old time favorite shrub roses include Chrysler Imperial (1953), Iceberg (1958), Hansa (1905) and Peace (1946).

or the **starfish cactus** (aka Carrion Flower) blooms every September or October, and flies are a big fan of the scent. The plant is a spineless, succulent cactus that blooms with flesh-colored, hairy, starfish-shaped flowers, which measure up to 10 inches across. By the way, maggots are a fan, too!

It has been just over two years since the corpse flower that was growing at our Poway store bloomed. That was big news! The Amorphophallus titanum is native to Sumatra and a relative of the non frightening Calla Lily. News stations flock to cover an emerging bloom because it's not an everyday occurrence. In cultivation, the plant generally requires 7-10 years of vegetative growth before blooming for the first time. After its initial blooming, there can be considerable variation in blooming frequency. Some plants may not bloom again for another 7-10 years while others may bloom every two to three years.

We sell a lot of food that plants love, but we don't sell what makes

a carnivorous plant feel full. That's because nature provides them with the bugs, like ants, that they crave. Carnivorous plants, of which there is believed to be more than 600 species, are found in areas where the soil is poor. Charles Darwin first wrote about such plants in 1875. There are five basic trapping mechanisms found in all these plants: Pitfall traps, fly paper traps, snap traps, bladder traps (the traps have small trigger hairs attached to a trapdoor. When the trigger hairs are tripped, the trap door opens up, sucks in the insect and surrounding water, and closes the door again, all in a matter of 1 ten thousandth of a second) and lobster pot traps (traps that are easy to enter but impossible to exit). Some of these plants you are familiar with such as the Venus Fly Trap, Nepenthes, North **American Pitcher Plant, Corkscrew** plant, and Sundews. You can find several of these plants in the bog garden at our Poway location.

If you can't scare folks with bad smells or by eating bugs, some plants can just look spooky. The

Toothache Plant, Spilanthes Acmella,

is a member of the Asteraceae family, as are sunflowers. Chewing on the leaves or flower heads of the Toothache Plant numbs the inside of the mouth and can relieve the pain of a toothache, which is how this plant got this name. It is also commonly known as the **Eyeball Plant** because its flowers look like eyeballs.

Capsicum annum 'Black Pearl', an ornamental Pepper plant with blackpurple leaves and shiny black berries all but screams its need to be part of Halloween. Juncus spiralis is an interesting plant that has spiraled corkscrew-like stems and no foliage. It can look like crazy hair and looks pretty terrific when planted in a head shaped container with open top. Corn stalks, just like you'd find in a corn maze, would look even more sinister if they were black. Resembling such a notion is Pennisetum 'Vertigo' and Pennisetum 'Black Stockings'. Both have red/black sword-like foliage.

So, there you have it—some scary smelling, bug eating, spooky plants of All Hallows' Eve! •

New Point of Sale System

Hedge Fund\$ Changes

For those who have Hedge Fund\$ accounts with us, your points will transfer over to the new system.

Starting January 2, we will no longer be able to redeem paper certificates so make sure that you use them! As always, lost or missing certificates cannot be replaced. Going forward, the new system will track online your Hedge Fund\$ benefits. When you have points redeemable towards a purchase a cashier will let you know. The expiration time periods which will not change will also be tracked. This means that unredeemed Hedge Fund\$ will be deducted from your account after the expiration date passes. We apologize that we aren't able to make exceptions to this event.

The new system will also allow us to better track customer's purchase history and will bring a myriad of back-office improvements. As always, we strive to make things better and to better serve you, our customers. •

Plants, Haircuts & An Improbable History

What do you get when you cross a plant store with a barber shop? You get Botanic

Panic, an adorable plant shop that shares space with a hybrid salon/barber shop on a kitschy block in the Mission District in San Francisco.

That's what I found during a quick get away to the City by the Bay. At Botanic Panic you'll find monstera, pathos, bromeliads, succulents, palms and ferns along with unusual and rare offerings as well as plant accessories.

The space is bright and airy and shared with Fellow Barber which has an interesting history. According to its website, the fixtures have traveled the country, served presidents, burned in a fire, and been reunited. The wooden fixtures in the barber shop were initially built for the 1893 World's Fair in Chicago. After the Fair, they went to New Orleans. In 1906, they were sold and half went to Texas where they saw almost 100 years of continuous use in a barbershop frequented by President Johnson while he was in college. The other half went to San Francisco and were destroyed in the 1906 earthquake and fire before Fellow Barber reunited the stations in 2013. •

- The plant warranty on most plants has been extended to 6 months from 90 days.
- Some items are final sale.
- The return policy will be printed on


receipts and invoices. If you opt to have your receipt emailed, it will be there as well. It will also be posted at each of the registers.

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From Proven Winners comes an eye-catching container idea for fall. I'm making it great by suggesting it could do double duty as a Halloween planter by adding a fun pick, or piece of Halloween décor. After Halloween remove the spooky item and let it transition to the rest of fall.

To make this planter, let's recap the elements you should bear in mind when creating any container garden. You will need a *thriller* (focal piece which can be a plant or décor), *spiller* (something that trails), and *filler* (plug in the holes with more plants).

Here's the recipe to make this container garden:

Spiller effect is from two
Superbells® Red Calibrachoa
hybrid. Filler is two Sunsatia®
Blood Orange™ Nemesia
hybrid and the thriller is one
Graceful Grasses® 'Fireworks'
Variegated Red Fountain Grass
Pennisetum setaceum 'Rubrum'.
More spiller, Sweet Caroline
Sweetheart Jet Black™ Sweet
Potato Vine Ipomoea batatas
was included.

If you can't find these specific plants, you can substitute with different colors and varieties.

To Do List: October



Plant Chinese Pistache to provide fall color



Plant carrots, cauliflower, and more



Plant

- > California natives and droughttolerant plants are best planted this time of year to get root systems established.
- > Bulbs like Daffodils, Ranunculus, Freesias, Anemones and more.
- > Winter annuals like Stocks, Snapdragons, Pansies, Violas, and Primrose.
- > Cool season vegetables like broccoli, cauliflower, kale, lettuce, peas, carrots and more!
- > Shrubs such as Camellias and Azaleas, and trees that provide wonderful fall color such as Ginko, Pistache, and Liquidambar.

Lawns

> Overseed Bermuda lawns with Annual Rye.

> It's a great time to plant Fescue from seed or sod.

Fertilize

- > For lawns, use Marathon Fertilizer for tall fescue, and Bonide DuraTurf Weed & Feed to feed grass and control broadleaf weeds.
- > Feed ornamentals, vegetables, citrus, avocado, fruit trees, palms and tropicals with E.B. Stone or Dr. Earth.
- > Do not feed Camellias until after they are finished flowering.

Water

When dry Santa Ana winds are expected, make sure to get extra water on plants and lawns before needed, especially container plants. •

- No Guarantee or Returns on: Plants less than 6 inch pot, hanging baskets, color bowls, florist/specialty plants, orchids, bromeliads, bonsai, Poinsettias, annuals, vegetables, citrus, Christmas Trees (live and cut), holiday garland, holiday décor and some other seasonal merchandise.
